1. VISION AND OBJECTIVES OF THE UNIVERSITY



The break-up of the students is presented below:










MCLIS- 2017-18

Hon'ble Shri Justice Sanjay Kishan Kaul, Judge, Supreme Court of India, in his Lordship's capacity as the Visitor of the NLIU, will grace the occasion and as the Chief Guest will deliver the Convocation Address. Hon'ble Shri Justice Ravi Malimath, Chief Justice of Madhya Pradesh High Court and Chancellor of National Law Institute University, will award Medals to meritorious students. Hon'ble Shri Justice Ravi Malimath will also distribute degrees to the successful students of B.A.LL.B. (Hons.), LL.M., MCLIS and Ph.D. programs.

8. PRESENTATION OF MEDALS AND CERTIFICATES

National Law Institute University, Bhopal is a firm believer in encouraging the students for their good performance in academics and in furtherance of this, the University has instituted several medals for meritorious students in all the programs.

The details of the medals are given below:

1. THE JUSTICE J.S. VERMA MEMORIAL AWARD

Justice Jagdish Sharan Verma (18.01.1933 to 22.04.2013)

Hon'ble Mr. Justice Jagdish Sharan Verma, Former Chief Justice of India, is one of the most eminent justices of the country. He was born on January, 18, 1933 at Satna, Madhya Pradesh. After receiving his early education at Satna and Lucknow, he obtained his B.Sc. and LL.B. Degrees from the University of Allahabad. He was enrolled as a pleader of the Judicial Commissioners' Court of erstwhile Vindhya Pradesh at Rewa in 1955 and as an Advocate of the Madhya Pradesh High Court in 1959.

Justice Verma was appointed Judge of the Madhya Pradesh High Court on September 12, 1972. He was the Chief Justice of the Madhya Pradesh High Court and the Rajasthan High Court from 1985 to 1989. He was assigned the onerous duties to act as the Governor of Rajasthan not once but twice in 1987 and 1989. His Lordship was elevated to the Supreme Court of India on June 3, 1989 and occupied the highest position as the 27th Chief Justice of India on March 25th, 1997. Justice J.S. Verma was appointed Chairperson, National Human Rights Commission on 4th November, 1999. As the Chairperson of NHRC, he made a mark in upholding human rights of deprived, depressed and downtrodden members of our society. He headed a number of Commissions with distinction at the national level.

Hallmark characteristics of Justice Verma are character and creativity, capability and confidence, commitment and craftsmanship, fairness, fearlessness, humility and honesty and independence and impartiality etc. His clarity of thoughts and interpretative skills are very well reflected in his several landmark judgments which have helped to humanise our legal system particularly in the field of criminal justice administration, constitutional jurisprudence and public law concepts.

Justice Verma is known for his firm conviction that "judge must judge himself", to the values of rule of law, judicial accountability and his standard in public life.

A collection of his famous speeches has been published as a book titled 'New Dimensions of Jus-

tice'. His book titled 'New Universe of Human Rights' is an evidence of his long-lasting contribution to the discipline of law and jurisprudence. His Lordship was earlier conferred the 'Honaris Causa' during the Fourth Convocation of the National Law Institute University, Bhopal, held on 9-11-2011 in the University Auditorium.

His Lordship laid the Foundation Stone of the National Law Institute University, Bhopal in ite Kerwa Dam Road Campus, on 12-05-1997 in the august presence of Hon'ble Mr. Justice A.K. Mathur, the then Chief Justice of M.P. High Court, Shri Digvijay Singh, the then Chief Minister of Madhya Pradesh, Shri Rajendra Prasad Shukla, the then Minister of Law, Government of M.P., Shri Ravindra Choubey, the then Minister of Higher Education, Government of M.P., and other dignitaries.

The NLIU in recognition of his services rendered to the legal profession in general and to the NLIU in particular has instituted the University Gold Medal in fond memory of His Lordship. This Medal is awarded to meritorious student of Five-year integrated B.A.LL.B (Hons.) Course of the NLIU.

2. PROFESSOR V.S. REKHI GOLD MEDAL AWARD

Professor (Dr.) V.S. Rekhi, (01.08.1937 to 04.02.2008)

Professor (Dr.) Virendra Singh Rekhi was born in Bijawar, (District Chatarpur) and later shifted to District Datiya of Madhya Pradesh. He obtained the Degree of LL.B. from the Agra University and Degree of LL.M. from University of Lucknow. He obtained the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy from the Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh (AMU). He served Lucknow University as a Lecturer from 1959 to 1966. Thereafter, he joined AMU as a faculty and became Reader and the National Professor of Constitutional Law. He served as the Dean, Faculty of Law, AMU and Head of the Law Department, AMU not once, twice, but thrice. This itself is a testimony to his administrative capabilities in addition to his academic excellence. His acceptability in the teaching community of AMU can be gauged from the fact that he was unanimously elected as the President, Staff Association, AMU at a very crucial historical moment of AMU. It was moment after Aziz Basha, the minority character of AMU was debated in the Parliament of India. The way in which Professor Rekhi pleaded the cause, he became the blue-eyed boy of AMU. This speaks a volume about the non-negotiable faith of Professor Rekhi in constitutional ideal of secularism. He served on different committees of various universities and governments. He superannuated from the AMU in the year 1997.

After superannuating from AMU, he was appointed as the Founder Director of the National Law Institute University, Bhopal. He served NLIU from 06-05-1998 to 04-06-2003. He laid the academic foundation of NLIU and developed the curriculum of B.A.LL.B (Hons.). He made tireless

efforts in establishing NLIU as the prime Centre of legal education and research of the country. Reading Materials distributed to students were prepared under his exclusive supervision.

Professor Rekhi was awarded the prestigious Fulbright Fellowship and the Fellowship of American Council of Learned Society. A law teacher widely acclaimed by students and academic community both in India and abroad. Professor Rekhi has left a legacy of legal learning. Besides being an effective law teacher, Professor Rekhi has a passion of reading literature, sociology, history, economics, political science, medicine and technology. His approach to teaching was informed by the knowledge of other disciplined which he brought to bear on legal discourse. He visited and lectured at various International Universities of the world such as Harvard and Wisconsin.

In recognition of his services rendered to the legal education and research, NLIU has instituted University Gold Medal in his fond memory. This Medal is awarded to meritorious Final year student of Five-year integrated B.A.LL.B. (Hons.) course of NLIU.

3. THE JUSTICE GURU PRASANNA SINGH MEMORIAL AWARD

Hon'ble Mr. Justice Guru Prasanna Singh (3 January 1922- 5 October 2013)

An embodiment of supreme qualities, Justice G.P. Singh was born on 3rd January 1922 in a village of Raipur Karchulian in Rewa District of Madhya Pradesh. After completing his school education from Central Hindu School, Kashi (Benaras), Justice Singh has his College education from Benaras Hindu University. He did his Masters of Science in 1941 by securing top position in the merit list, thereafter, Justice G.P. Singh earned his law degree from Benaras Hindu University in year 1944.

Hon'ble Justice G.P. Singh started his career in the field of Law in 1945 as a pleader of the Court of erstwhile Rewa State and thereafter got himself enrolled as an Advocate at Rewa on 16-01-1954. After Re-organisation of the States and creation of Madhya Pradesh with Principal Seat of High Court at Jabalpur, Justice G.P. Singh had shifted to Jabalpur and joined the High Court Bar in Year 1957.

Hon'ble Justice G.P. Singh was always an ideal and a source of inspiration to his fellow lawyers. He had throughout helped his junior lawyers in inculcating the highest values of professional conduct including, honesty, hard-work and commitment to the cause of justice. He was throughout acclaimed for his impeccable integrity, forthright conduct and dedication towards his duties.

Justice G.P. Singh was elevated to the Bench on 7th November, 1967 as Additional Judge of High Court of Madhya Pradesh and later on appointed as permanent Judge on 29th July, 1968. Considering his deep understanding of judicial system and administrative capabilities he was appointed as

Chief Justice of Madhya Pradesh High Court on 27th July, 1978, which office he had held till January, 1984. He had delivered several landmark judgments which adorn the law journals. Indeed, his judgments are testimony of his academic excellence and deep understanding of law.

Hon'ble Justice G.P. Singh immensely contributed to the legal system. After demitting the office of the Chief Justice, he had rendered his valuable services in the capacity of Chairman, Madhya Pradesh Law Commission from 1990 to 1992. He was appointed as Lokayukta of Madhya Pradesh on 30th March, 1992, which office he had held till 29th March, 1997.

During his tenure as Chief Justice of Madhya Pradesh High Court, Justice Singh twice functioned as Acting Governor of Madhya Pradesh first- from 26th May, 1981 to 9th July, 1981 and thereafter from 21st September, 1983 to 7th October, 1983.

Justice G.P. Singh was a great scholar of law. During initial days of his career, for about 10 years, he was visiting faculty of law of T.R.S. College, Rewa. Justice G.P. Singh has a flair for legal writing. His book titled 'Principles of Statutory Interpretation', is internationally acclaimed as a masterpiece on statutory interpretation. The first edition of this famous book was published in 1966.

A Book has also been published by Butterworths, Wadhwa, Nagpur, which is a collection of selected 49 judgments rendered by Justice G.P.Singh covering multiple aspects of law-civil, constitutional, criminal and taxation.

Gifted with the rare quality of research and legal analysis, Justice G.P. Singh had the distinction of revising the 24th Edition of famous treatise on Law of Torts.

IN recognition of the tremendous contribution made by Justice G.P. Singh to the judicial system, on 7th January, 1984, he was awarded Honorary Degree of Doctor of Law (LL.D) by Rani Durgavati University, Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh.

He was also awarded the Degree of LL.D (Honoris Causa) by the National Law Institute University, Bhopal in its First Convocation held on 16th December, 2007.

4. PT. RAMLALJI SHARMA MEMORIAL AWARD

Pt. Ramlalji Sharma lovingly called Kakkaji, was a man of principles, and epitome of selflessness and sacrifice. Born on 17th June, 1910 in Dolaria near Hoshangabad. He did his Masters in Economics from Morris College, Nagpur and was a gold medalist. He also graduated in Law and started practice in 1933. He was a man of great accomplishment. His persona was an easy blend of educational, religious, spiritual, social, cultural, economic and agricultural interest. He was not

only an educationist and an eminent lawyer but a social worker too, a combination to be rarely found in a man.

His dedication to the field of education was exemplary. He was a man of vision. His idea was to build a college where academics are of unmatchable standards, staff is highly qualified and students who not only channelize their energies towards education, but also make efforts on being men of character. The Narmada Mahavidyalya or NMV hence is renowned for discipline. The ascent of college from its humble state with limited number of classrooms and ever-growing number of students to the present state is still remembered by people who have had the privilege to be a part of such educational system.

He was an eminent lawyer. His powerful oration and incredible intelligence gave him immense frame and credibility. He practiced law and appeared before courts of Hoshangabad and Bhopal along with these he appeared before the High-Courts of Gwalior, Jabalpur and Allahabad and the Supreme Court. He established one of the largest libraries in the area which included All-India Reporters and other journals. He was the jewel of the Hoshangabad Bar Association. Due to his intellect and incredible knowledge of the subject he earned a name for himself from district Courts to High Court and the Supreme Court.

Pt. Ramlalji Sharma never sought donations as the idea of begging was repugnant to him. He had a constructive mindset and epitomized an ever-active life. Being an eminent lawyer and educationist, he introduced, the law Faculty in Narmada Mahavidyalaya as early as 1950s. He also established around 15 educational institutions throughout the district of Hoshangabad, with the sole motive of imparting education to the unreached.

He introduced discipline of Arts in 1954, Commerce and Science in 1958 on the graduation level in the Narmada Mahavidyalaya. He introduced classes in English Literature and Economics in 1963, Hindi Literature and Commerce in 1964, Mathematics and Botany in 1969 and in 1970 in Economics and Zoology on the Post-graduation level.

He was a progressive agriculturalist and a profoundly religious man. An insight to his pursuit of religion stands in the form of Satsang Bhawan on the bank on River Narmada, a place where holymen would stay and devout persons would assemble to listen to religious discourses. He had an immense faith in Ramayana. Every year when the courts would be off in the summers he used to go on a pilgrimage to Badrinath and Kedarnath and used to spend at least a month in Haridwar.

He was an institution in himself. His life devoted to education and social work remains embedded in the minds of the people who had the honour to be associated with him. He had so much to offer to all of them and they had so much to learn from him. He was a legend and shall remain so for centuries to come.

5. MRS. PRATIBHA DUBEY MEMORIAL AWARD

Late Mrs. Pratibha Dubey was the wife of Eminent Doctor Ajay Prakash Dubey of Bhopal. She obtained her M.A. in Econimics from Bhopal. She wrote short stories, poetry and also authored books. Her articles were published in Newspapers. She also sung devotional songs (Bhajans). She narrated the Dohas written by Shri A.K. Payasi, Former Principal Secretary of Vidhan Sabha.

She was two daughters, Ms. Pallavi, Ms. Dipika and one son Mr. Animesh Dubey. Her daughter Ms. Dipika Dubey was the bonafide student of Five year integrated B.A.LL.B. (Hons.) Course of the National Law Institute University, Bhopal from the years 1999-2004.

Dr. Ajay Prakash Dubey and Mr. Animesh Dubey has instituted the Gold Medal and Scholarship in fond memory of Late Mrs. Pratibha Dubey. This Medal is awarded to meritorious Final year student of Five-year integrated B.A.LL.B. (Hons.) Course of the NLIU.

6. THE NANI A. PALKHIWALA MEMORIAL AWARD

Mr. Nani A. Palkiwala (16.01.1920 to 11.12.2002)

Nani A. Palkhiwala was born in 1920 in Bombay to blue collar, middle-class Parsi parents. His family name derives from the profession of his forefathers (a common practice among Parsis) who had been manufacturers of palanquins ("palkhis").

He was educated in Masters Tutorial High School, and later at St. Xavier's College, both in Bombay. He was a dedicated scholar and excelled even though hampered by a bad stammer. At college, he earned a Masters' degree in English literature. He overcame his speech impediment.

Upon graduating, Palkhiwala applied for a position as Lecturer at Bombay University, but was not awarded the post. Soon found himself trying to obtain admissions to institutions of higher learning to further his academic career. It being late in the term, most courses were closed, and he enrolled at Government Law College, Bombay, where he discovered that he had a gift for unravelling the intricacies of jurisprudence.

Mr. Nani Palkhiwala was called to the Bar in 1944 and served in the chambers of the legendary Sir Jamshedji Behramji Kanga in Bombay. He quickly gained a reputation as an eloquent and articulate Barrister, and was often the Center of attention in Court, where students of law and younger members of the Bar Association would flog to watch him. His excellent court craftsmanship and an extraordinary ability to recall barely known facts rendered him an irresistible force.

Mr. Nani Palkhiwala initial forte was commercial and tax law. Together with Jamshedji, he authored what was then and still is today an authoritative work: 'The Law and Practice of Income

Tax. 'Mr. Palkhiwala was 30 years old at the time of first printing. Sir Jamshedji later admitted that the credit for this work belong exclusively to Mr. Nani.

Mr. Palkhiwala's first participation in a case of constitutional significance occurred in 1951 where he served as junior counsel in the case Nusserwanji Balsara v. State of Bombay [919510 Bom 210], assisting the esteemed Sir Noshirwan Engineer in challenging several provisions of the Bombay Prohibition Act. Before the year was out, Palkhiwala was arguing cases himself, but his first case of constitutional importance (a challenge of the validity of Land Requisition Acts) was lost before the Bombay High Court.

By 1954, however, barely 10 years after his admission to the Bar, Palkhiwala was arguing before the Supreme Court. It was in this, his first case before that court (concerning the interpretation of Article 29 (2) and Article 30 of the Indian Constitution, which regulate the rights of religious minorities) that he first articulated his (later) famous statements on the inviolate nature of the Constitution.

Mr. Palkhiwala received a great deal of recognition from academics, academic institutions and the government.

In 1963, Palkhiwala was offered a seat in the Supreme Court but declined. In 1968, he was offered the position of Attorney-General by Shri Govind Menon, the then Law Minister in the Congress Government. Mr. Palkhiwala recounts in his book 'We the Nation' "After a great deal of hesitation I agreed. When I was in Delhi I conveyed my acceptance to him, and he told me that the announcement would be made the next day. I was happy that the agonising hours of indecision were over. Sound sleep is one of the blessings I have always enjoyed. That night, I went to bed and looked forward to my usual quota of deep slumber. But suddenly and inexplicably, I became wide awake at three o'clock in the morning with the clear conviction, floating like a hook through my consciousness that my decision was erroneous and that I should reverse it before it was too late. Early in the morning I profusely apologized to the Law Minister for changing my mind. In the years immediately following, it was my privilege to argue on behalf of citizen, under the same Congress Government and against the government, the major cases which have shaped and moulded [...] constitutional law [...]"

Mr. Nani Palkhiwala was appointed Indian Ambassador to the United States in 1977 by the Janta Government (the first non- Congress Government in India) headed by Late Shri Morarji Desai and served in the capacity till 1979. He received Honorary Doctorates from Princeton University, Rutgers University, Lawrence University, University of Wisconsin-Madison, Annamalai University, Ambedkar Law University and the University of Mumbai. The laudation from Princetom called him "...Defender of constitutional liberties, champion of human rights...", and stated, "he

has courageously advanced him conviction that expediency in the nature of progress, at the cost of freedom, is no progress at all, but retrogation. Lawyer, teacher, author, and economic developers, he brings to us as Ambassador of India intelligence, good humour, experience, and vision for international understanding..."

In the last year of his life, Mr. Nani Palkhiwala was severely affected by what may have been Alzheimer's disease. According to Attorney General Soli J. Sorabjee, who had known him for many years, "it was painful to see that a person so eloquent and articulate unable to speak or recognize persons except occasionally in a momentary flash."

Mr. Nani Palkhiwala was taken critically ill on December 7, 2002, and taken to Jaslok Hospital in Mumbai. He died on Wednesday, December 11, 2002. He was 82 years of age.

The Nani A. Palkhiwala Memorial Trust, Mumbai, has instituted the Nani A. Palkhiwala Gold Medal in the year 2006. This Medal is awarded every year to bonafide topper student of prestigious LL.M Course of the National Law Institute University, Bhopal.

7.THE JUSTICE SHACHEENDRA DWIVEDI MEMORIAL AWARD

Justice Shacheendra Dwivedi (25.01.1937 to 23.10.2006)

Justice Shri Shacheendra Dwivedi, was born on 25.01.1937 at Isagarh District Guna. After having had his early education in D.A.V. School, Guna, he graduated in 1957 from Victoria College, Gwalior. He took his law degree in 1959 from Delhi University and became a member of the Senate Law Faculty, Delhi University. He was also a member of Jiwaji University, Gwalior, along with being a part time lecturer at MLB Government College, Gwalior.

Justice Shacheendra Dwivedi joined the Bar in 1960. During the years of his practice as an advocate, he was elected as Secretary, President and Vice President of the High Court Bar Association. He was the Chairman of the Disciplinary Committee of the Bar Council at Gwalior and was an active member of the Rotary Club. He was appointed as Judge of the High Court in Madhya Pradesh in 1990. His tenure as a Judge of M.P. High Court was from 28.07.1990 to 25.01.1999. After superannuation, he was appointed Chairman of M.P. Electricity Regulatory Authority, Bhopal.

In the year 2006 Justice Shacheendra Dwivedi headed the Committee appointed to investigate into gross misuse of administrative powers of the Speaker in administrative appointments and also the irregularities that strained the dignity of the Vidhan Sabha Secretariat. The recommendations prove to be very useful in the administrative appointments. He has also headed the Committee for Fixation of Fees for professional institutions. Justice Dwivedi believed that professional education should be available not just to the people from the upper classes but also the people from the lower rungs of the society.

Mr. Justice Shacheendra Dwivedi was an expert in Constitutional Law and Environmental Law. In one of his judgments regarding the state of medical facilities in the rural areas he noted "As it is often said and is also factually true that India lives in villages and the fact cannot be lost sight of that in the rural areas in the development medical facilities of examination and treatment of patients and private level are not available and mostly the patients have to depend only on the Government Doctors. Therefore, State should take policy decisions to encourage the doctors to serve the rural population".

Justice Shacheendra Dwivedi left for his heavenly abode on 23rd October 2006 and will always be remembered by the people of Madhya Pradesh for his invaluable contributions to this State and its people.

The family of Late Justice Shacheendra Dwivedi has instituted the Gold Medal. This Medal is awarded to bonafide topper student of prestigious LL.M Course of the National Law Institute University, Bhopal.

8. MR. RIZWAAN SHAAD MEMORIAL AWARD

Mr. Rizwaan Shaad (23.03.1990 to 19.09.2013)

Mr. Rizwaan Shaad hailed from Bohra Muslim Community of Gujarat. His father Dr. Anwar Shaad lives in Ujjain. He was the bonafide student of Two year Master of Science in Cyber Law & Information Security (MS-CLIS) Course of the National Law Institute University, Bhopal. He obtained his B.E. Degree in the area of Information Technology from Rajiv Gandhi Proudogiki Vishwavidyalaya. He was the First Student of Bohra Community to be enrolled for the prestigious MS-CLIS Course of the National Law Institute University, Bhopal in the academic session 2012-13.

He met his untimely death in a tragic car accident that occurred on 19.09.2013 during the academic session 2013-14. His father has instituted a Gold Medal in fond memory of his dear son. This Medal is awarded to meritorious Final year student of Two year MS-CLIS Course of the NLIU.

Trainings organised by CSIPR:

The Cell for Studies in Intellectual Property Rights (CSIPR) was established in the National Law Institute University, Bhopal, with an aim to promote and develop knowledge in Intellectual Property Rights (IPR). The primary goal of CSIPR is to enhance awareness of IPR in the University by involving students in meaningful discourse.

FACULTY PROFILE

Prof. (Dr.) S. S. Singh, Director

Prof. S.S. Singh holds hs Master and Ph.D. in Law from R.D University, Jabalpur. He had his advanced training in Training Methodology from University of Slough, U.K. He was awarded fellowships under the Higher Education Link Scheme of the British Council Division, British High Commission.

He worked as Professor of Justice and Administration at the Indian Institute of Public Administration, New Delhi. Before joining IIPA, Prof. Singh was associated with Department of Law, R.D. University, Jabalpur, currently he is working as Director, National Law Institute University, Bhopal.

Prof. Singh has done pioneering work in the area of consumer protection and welfare. He has completed two initial research studies in relation to the working of District Consumer Forums and State Commissions. He has also organized around 60 training programmes for the members of the State Consumer Commissions and the Presidents and the members of the District Consumer Forums. He was instrumental in setting up the Centre for Consumer Studies at IIPA with the financial assistance from the Department of Consumer Affairs, Govt. of India. He carried out a major consultancy assignment in the area of promoting involvement of research institutions/universities/colleges in consumer protection and consumer welfare from 2004-2005. He has been a Member of the Working Group on Consumer Protection constituted by the Planning Commission, Govt. of India for the Eleventh Five Year Plan.

His major areas of interest include Administrative Law, Constitutional Law, Consumer Protection, Ombudsman, Vigilance in Government; Administrative Accountability and Public Interest Litigation.

He has carried out a number of research and evaluation studies sponsored by National International agencies including, a path breaking research study on "Citizen and Administration: A Comparative Study of Ombudsman Institution in India and UK". Apart from this, he has conducted a number of research/evaluation studies. He has been associated with a number of committees and commissions on various aspects of administration.

A prolific writer, he has written more than twelve books and more than 75 research papers in different areas of public law and consumer justice administration. He is Member of a number of academic bodies.

Dr. S. Surya Prakash

Dr. S. Surya Prakash is a Professor of Law, National Law Institute University, Bhopal on lien at DamodaramSanjivayya National Law University, Vishakapatnam. He has more than twenty-eight years of experience in academia. Dr. Prakash obtained his Bachelor of Laws from Acharya

Nagarjuna University, Guntur, Andhra Pradesh and Masters of Law in Labour and Industrial Law from Andhra University, Vishakapatnam, Andhra Pradesh. In addition, he holds his Ph.D. in law from Berhampur University, Odisha.

Prior to NLIU, Prof. Prakash was a lecturer in MRVRGRLaw College Vijayanagaram, A.P. (1988-89) and Principal of D.N.R. College of Law, Bhimavaram, A.P. (1989-2001) Assistant Professor, NUJS, Calcutta (2001) Principal, Law College Nanded (2001-2003) before joining as Associate Professor (2003) in NLIU and became Professor in 2007. In addition, he has attended various national and international seminars, presented papers and chaired sessions.

Dr. Prakash has published more than twenty articles in various law journals and books. He has two books on "Bonded Labour and Social Justice" and Turning point (The story of a Law Teacher) Memoirs of Padma Shree Prof. N.R. Madhava Menon(2009). He did projects on "Inter-State Migrant Labour" DFID, Gramina Vikas Trust, "Access to Justice", (Report Writing) High Court of Madhya Pradesh and complied Health Laws in India and State of Madhya Pradesh (15 Volumes) for the Deptt. Of Health Govt. of Madhya Pradesh. His teaching and academic interests include Labour and Industrial Laws, Health Law, Business Law, Alternative Dispute Resolution and International Commercial Arbitration.

Dr. Mukesh Srivastava

Dr. Mukesh Srivastava is a Professor of English at the National Law Institute University, Bhopal. He obtained an M.A. from D.E.I. Agra University, and an M.Litt. and Ph.D. in English from the Central Institute of English and Foreign Languages, Hyderabad. He was awarded U.G.C. Junior and Senior Fellowships and a post-doctoral fellowship at the Indian Institute of Advanced Studies, Shimla.

He began his career as an editor in the Orient Longmans Publishing Company in 1992. He has also taught at the IIM Ahmedabad, Chicago, Department of South Asian Languages and Civilizations in the University of Chicago and the Osmania University, Hyderabad. He joined National Law Institute University, Bhopal, in 1999. His teaching and research areas include English, Media Law and Culture, and Law and Literature.

Prof. Srivastava has authored a book on Narrative Construction of India(2004) and contributed as Associate Editor to the two volumes of Women Writing in India(Feminist University Press, New York,1991-93). In addition, he has contributed more than twenty-three articles to various scholarly journals.

Dr. GhayurAlam

Professor GhayurAlam is the senior-most Professor of Law at the National Law Institute University, Bhopal. Prof. Alam holds his LL.B. and LL.M degree from Aligarh Muslim University, securing the second position in order of merit. In addition, he is a recipient of the Fulbright Fellowship to read for his Ph. D. at the George Washington University Law School, Washington DC, USA; Cardiff Law School and British Council Scholarship; Texas Instruments Scholarship by CASRIP,

University of Washington, USA; and AMU Merit Scholarship.

At NLIU, he introduced, taught, designed and developed several courses, including Common Law Method, Law of Contract, Intellectual Property Rights, International Trade Law, Sociology of Law, Jurisprudence, Constitutional Law, Administrative Law, Banking Law, Legal Writing, Science-Technology and Law, Biotechnology and Law, Civil Procedure Code, Seminar courses on Law and Information Technology, Law and Nuclear Technology, Law relating to Carriage of Goods, and Artificial Intelligence and Patent Law. Professor Alam specializes in the use of Case Method, Logic and Reasoning, and the methods of learning how to learn and apply the law. His areas of interest are Case Method, Intellectual Property Law and Business Laws.

Professor Alam has many publications to his credit in the form of articles, books and handbooks. He has also authored and co-authored the project reports for the agencies of the Government of India: DST, ICAR, Ministry of Environment and Forests, MP State Biodiversity Board, Madhya Pradesh Jal Nigam Maryadit and Department of School Education, Government of Madhya Pradesh. In addition, he has delivered more than three hundred and twenty invited expert lectures on various topical issues of law in academic programs organized by the institutions of national repute. In addition, he participated in academic programs organized in the USA, UK, Republic of South Korea, Doha, Qatar and Geneva, Switzerland in his academic pursuit.

Dr. Uday Pratap Singh

Professor Uday Pratap Singh is a Professor of Human Rights at the National Law Institute University, Bhopal. He has an M.A. in History and Ph.D. in Human Rights from the University of Delhi. Dr. Singh also holds LL.B. from Barkatullah University, Bhopal. He was awarded the UGC Junior Research Fellowship and Senior Research Fellowship.

Dr.U.P.Singh has done several developmental projects for the National Human Rights Commission (Fact-Finding Study on Manganese poisoning and Tribal deaths due to poverty in Balaghat district, M.P.), World Bank-funded projects (Environment and Tribal Rights) and UNDP projects (Access to justice and Informal Justice System in Madhya Pradesh), Madhya Pradesh State Human Rights Commission (Right to Health for people living in forest villages and Evaluation Study Report on the Working of M.P. His teaching and research interests include Human Rights, Disability Rights, Juvenile Justice, Women's Rights, History, Indian Legal History, Human Rights and Culture and Informal Justice

Systems. He offers courses at both undergraduate and post-graduate levels.

Dr. Rajiv Kumar Khare

Professor Rajiv Khare is a Professor of Law at NLIU, Bhopal. He has a Master's degree in Constitutional and Administrative Law from Nagpur University. He completed his doctorate from National Law Institute University, Bhopal. He is the Chairperson for the Centre for Environmental and Natural Resources Law and the Faculty-in-charge of the Cell for Awareness and Research in Environmental Law Studies at NLIU. Prof. Khare is also the Proctor of the University and contributes to addressing the student concerns and welfare.

Professor Tapan Mohanty is a Professor of Sociology of Law/ Socio-legal studies at NLIU, Bhopal. He is an Erasmus Mundus Fellow, ICSSR doctoral fellow and a former research fellow of the Ministry of Environment and Forest, Government of India. He has Masters degree in sociology as well as in law. Dr. Mohanty did his doctorate from Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi on 'Culture, Development and Entrepreneurship: A Study of Silk Traders of Chanderi'. He has completed four major research projects on diverse issues like educational management (NUEPA), Bhopal Gas Tragedy (World Bank and MoEF), Engendering Criminal Law (NCW) and Implementation of PCPNDT Act (UNFPA), Rajiv Gandhi Advocates Training Scheme (Ministry of Law, Govt. of India).

He has more than 60 research articles to his credit published in international and national referred journals viz; Curriculum and Teaching, Economic and Political Weekly, Vikalpa, Sociological Bulletin, Journal of Educational Planning and Administration, Journal of Indian Institute of Public Administration, Bangladesh Journal of Development Studies, Neetisurethi (Sri Lanka), Bangladesh Journal of Development Studies, Mainstream to name a few.





Unidentify Fee

During the course of audit, it was observed that Unidentify Fee A/c was found in books of accounts amounting to Rs. 294444.86 (Dr Balance)of which no proper explanation was given by Accounts Department. Out of the above amount, Rs. 80000.00 relates to Accounting and Bank Reconciliation error done in the FY 2015-16 and rest Rs. 214444.86 belongs to Fee Receipt income of current year. As per our observation, the above blunder has resulted due to the lethargic and careless attitude of Accounts Department. Therefore, in lack of proper clarity, the above amount is shown in Income & Expenditure underSchedule -11: Fee from Student.

3. Security Services

During the course of audit, it was observed that the amount of Provident Fund and Employee State Insurance is collected by the M/s. National Ex. Service Man Security Service from the University being the principle employer. However, the total amount so collected is not fully deposited with the relevant authority in the next prevailing month. Such deviation was observed by comparing challans received by the University for respective month with the amount charged for PF/ESI as per the bill received.

4. Bank Reconciliation

 Bank Balance of Dena Bank Fees A/c (5196) as on 31.03.2018 is subject to reconciliation and following differences were found in the Bank Reconciliation of the same for the period of 2016-17 which were not reconciled till the date of audit.

- 12. During the course of audit it has been found that the agreement between NLIU and Baba & Sons for fixing of chairs in Convention Centre was unsigned on part of NLIU.
- 13. The Institution follows Cash basis of Accounting and recognizes Income and Expenditure on Cash basis, however TDS is claimed as per 26 AS which includes TDS on accrued income.
- 14. University has Incomes such as Guest House Rent, Project Receipt and Tender Document fees which makes it liable for GST. However, no GST registration has been taken by the University till date.
- 15. University has received Grant from Government under UGC XII plan amounting to Rs.15180703.00. However, no bifurcation of such Grant as Recurring or Non Recurring was received by us. Therefore, the above amount is shown in Income & Expenditure under Schedule-10
- 16. There is no movement in Project Liabilities under Schedule-9 amounting Rs. 1400672.50. The above amount should be used or refunded if the purpose for which the amount was received has been fulfilled.

The Institute is following cash basis of accounting but still they are booking receivable from students for fees as Debtors due to which debtors has a closing balance of Rs. 525189.42 at the year end which is incorrect as per the cash basis of accounting. To Rectify this, we have adjusted the extra booking of fees with debtors by reducing the amounts from debtors and fees from Students.

SCHEDULE 17: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NOTES TO ACCOUNTS AS AT 31ST MARCH, 2018

A. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accounts of the Institution are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Applicable Accounting Standards. Accounting policies not specifically referred to are consistent with Generally Accepted Accounting Practices. The Institution follows Cash basis of Accounting and recognizes Income and Expenditure on Cash basis. However till last year Legal Expenses, Audit Expenses, Electricity Expenses and Telephone Expenses were done on accrual basis.

2. GRANT IN AID

Non-Recurring Grants: Grants of the nature of Contribution towards Capital Expenditure is shown under Earmarked fund and to the extent utilised in the year are treated as part of Capital Fund.

Recurring Grants: Grant received for meeting the Revenue Expenditure is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Account.

3. CAPITAL FUND ACCOUNT

Capital Fund is created with the amount transferred from Earmarked Fund as utilised for BuildingConstruction and Expenditure incurred on other assets.

4. FUND ACCOUNT

Earmarked and Endowment fund created from Grant received in the nature of Capital from M.P. Government and UGC is accounted in accordance with AS-12.

5. FIXED ASSETS

Fixed Assets are stated at Cost less Accumulated Depreciation. The cost of an asset comprises its purchase price and any directly attributable cost of bringing the asset to working condition for its intended use. Expenditure for additions, improvements and renewals are capitalised and expenditure for maintenance and repairs are charged to Income and Expenditure Account. Fixed assets acquired out of Capital Finds are stated at cost and corresponding grant shown as Capital Funds under Liabilities.

6. DEPRECIATION

Depreciation is charged as per income Tax Act, 1961. No depreciation is charged on **Building under Construction**



B. NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

1. The key observations have been mentioned in the Management Report which has been issued separately to the Management.

2. FIXED ASSETS

In cases where the assets are purchased out of project grants for use in the projects and no specific commitment exist; the equivalent amounts of the assets so purchased are treated as Capital Funds.

The Capital Fund during the year includes Building under Construction Rs. 2453551.00 which is on account of expenditure on Construction of Convention Centre of Rs.2453551.00.

3. EARMARKED ENDOWMENT FUND ACCOUNT

Following are the expenditures incurred by the University out of own funds, for which the grant is still receivable:
