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MESSAGE FROM THE VICE CHANCELOR






MESSAGE FROM THE FACULTY COORDINATOR

ABOUT NLIU BHOPAL





Located in the heart of India, amidst the picturesque hills of the Vindhyas, NLIU, Bhopal was established in 1997 by a legislation of the Madhya Pradesh state legislature. It is the second National Law University to be established in the country, and has been recognised by the Bar Council of India (BCI) and the University Grants Commission (UGC). The University is a member of the Association of Indian Universities and the Hon'ble Chief Justice of India is its patron. It also works closely with the High Court of Madhya Pradesh & the National Judicial Academy situated in Bhopal. As one of India's premier law schools, the University endeavors to enhance the legal landscape of India and contribute to the society with the help of its experienced faculty and bright young minds.

It provides an excellent platform for its students to grow as independent individuals capable of making meaningful contributions in their chosen path of life. The University aims to develop and nurture intellect, enabling its students to contribute to the national development in law and justice. To this end, the University seeks to provide its students with an environment which is a healthy mix of fervour, idealism, experience and moderating values in order to inculcate in them the knowledge, confidence and competence to become capable lawyers of tomorrow.

COURSES

With a total student intake of 120 students per year, NLIU hosts over 600 students enrolled in its graduate and undergraduate programs. The five year integrated B.A. LL.B. (Hons.) program, the one year LL.M. program and the newly introduced B.S.C.LL.B. (Hons.) accept students through the intensive Common Law Admission Test (CLAT). The University also has a two-year post-graduate course of Master of Science in Cyber Law and Information Security (MSCLIS) as well as a Ph.D. program.




The University has also introduced the 5 year B.SC. LL.B. (Hons.) [Cyber Security] course which aims to blend law and technology and to impart a comprehensive understanding of the legal regime pertaining to Cyber Security, Data Blockchain Protection. Technology. Artificial Intelligence and multi-media protection. Further, the University also has received approval from the IBBI to begin the first of its kind Graduate Insolvency Program ("GIP") which aims at tapping the potential of young aspirants who have the dynamism and ability to excel in the field of insolvency resolution.

ACADEMIC STRUCTURE & PEDAGOGY

"Only the top 1% of all candidates appearing for the Common Law Admission Test (CLAT) across the country are granted admission into the University." The University follows an intensive Semester System for its B.A. LL.B. (Hons.) Program, wherein each year is divided into 2 semesters of 90 working days each. In each semester, students are required to undergo mid-term and end-term written examinations in each subject and submit a project research work in each subject (which includes a written submission and an oral presentation of the same). Thus, throughout the span of 10 semesters, each student is to undergo an intensive schedule of 4200 compulsory credit hours, 360 compulsory clinical hours, 76 written examinations, 540 days of work experience, 44 compulsory research papers, 8 compulsory seminar papers, and 44 compulsory oral presentations. The University follows a robust teaching methodology which is a combination of classroom lectures accompanied by powerpoint presentations and field studies.

This methodology ensures that students are taught in a holistic manner, such that they are equipped with the ability to approach legal issues with a broad outlook, therefore leading to their all-rounded development as legal professionals. Each faculty member creates extensive study material and ancillary resources, which are regularly revised and updated to ensure that the syllabus is in line with current legal affairs. The subject is not restricted to just academic studies but is all-encompassing so that the class lectures offer a deeper understanding of each subject.



Through the span of 10 semesters, students are taught 4 core courses, and in addition, skilled courses such as Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR), Drafting & Pleading and Moot Court as part of the Clinical Legal Education. In the final 2 semesters, students are provided with the opportunity to choose 2 optional subjects each semester, along with the compulsory subjects so that they gain a deeper understanding of certain specific legal discipline.



THE DIFFERENCE AT NLIU

The University aims to produce legal professionals equipped with the broad visionary and evolutionary qualities necessary to deal with the professional requirements of today. The infrastructure and resources of the University provide a perfect impetus to the student community to indulge in a wide array of meaningful activities ranging from academic and co-curricular pursuits to social welfare initiatives.

Since its inception, the University has furthered its research, dissemination and knowledge outreach goals though a policy of organising programmes, workshops, conferences and seminars for students. The students play an integral part in organising and managing such activities through several cells and centres established in the University. All these activities organized at the University are aimed at ensuring holistic legal education with practical training for the students.

INTERNATIONAL LAW

The University has been rendering a noteworthy analysis of issues of national importance with an international perspective. Further, the University curriculum on International Law gives students a broad perspective of public international law, political sciences, international relations and private international law. The Cell for Research in International Law ("CRIL") is an academic association of students aimed at promoting interest and research in the field of international law. CRIL also caters to the inquisitive minds by publishing blogs on international law topics. In this academic session, CRIL launched its first journal of international law and policy which is dedicated to resolving legal issues prevalent in international law. Further, the NLIU CRIL Blog has been ranked amongst the top 40 International Law Blogs (worldwide) by Feedspot today, for the second year in a row.

LITIGATION & ALTERNATE DISPUTE RESOLUTION

The Moot Court Association ("MCA") organizes moot court activities, and also solicits participation of students in activities like client counselling and mock trials. Through these activities, students learn how legal principles have real-world applications. The MCA converted the hardships caused by COVID-19 into a blissful opportunity successfully organized all the internal pools and three events in the virtual format throughout the year. Firstly, the 4th NLIU-Link Legal National Client Counselling Competition witnessed the MCA's collaboration with Link-Legal India Law Services, SCC Online, and EBC. Secondly, the 10th INSOL India-NLIU National Corporate Law Moot, 2022 witnessed participation from leading Indian law universities. Lastly, the 7th NLIU-Justice R.K. Tankha Memorial International Arbitration Moot witnessed participation from Universities across the globe. A corollary to court room experience, the Alternative Dispute Resolution Cell ("ADRC") at the University offers top-notch mediation and negotiation training to students and hosts the oldest and largest mediation competition in the country. It was established in 2007 and is the oldest Alternative Dispute Resolution cell. The cell, this year, organized the 11th edition of its flagship NLIU-INADR International Mediation Tournament, 2022. This cell's focus is on international and national arbitration law developments, with an emphasis on dynamic research into relevant contemporary issues. Thus, legal education at the University has emphasized training in alternative dispute resolution methods in addition to traditional methods. Alternative dispute resolution ("ADR") training has received a great deal of attention. The University's curriculum includes a Clinical Legal Course to train students in both litigation as well as in alternative forms of dispute resolution thus, training students in counselling, professional ethics and drafting.

CORPORATE LAW

The present-day economic scenario necessitates an in-depth knowledge of market trends, international financial transactions and niche business practices.

The University has pragmatically incorporated these core areas in its syllabi, including courses on Legal Writing and Capital Markets. The corporate curriculum is supplemented by a gamut of activities in the University conducted by the Centre for Business and Commercial Laws ("CBCL"), a 'centre of excellence' in the University, which focuses on research and encourages discussion among students in the field of corporate laws and other allied subjects. The CBCL team has organized a number of events in association with leading law firms, publishing houses, and research institutions, foremost among which is the NLIU-Trilegal Summit on Corporate and Commercial Laws and the NLIU-Khaitan Course on Corporate Law & NLIU-Saraf & Partners Course on Insolvency & Bankruptcy Laws. Additionally, CBCL has been successfully organizing regular guest lectures, delivered by experts in the field of business law along with sessions on corporate law termed the 'Corporate Hour' discussion series on a monthly basis for updating students with the developments of law in the corporate environment. The CBCL has also established 'The CBCL Blog' which publishes submissions from students and practitioners across India, on issues relevant to the allied areas of corporate law. CBCL has also launched a legal assistance unit which aids start-ups with their legal compliance requirements. The Centre for Business and Commercial Laws (CBCL) launched 'Karobar', an initiative under which the final year students of the Cell gave probono legal assistance to start-ups.

CBCL also assisted the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Board of India in organising the IBBI National Essay Writing Competition on the theme 'Role of the IBC in the development of the Credit market in India'. In addition, volume II of the NLIU Journal of Business Laws was also released during this academic session.

In this academic session, the University has received approval from the IBBI to begin the first of its kind Graduate Insolvency Program ("GIP"), which aims at tapping the potential of young aspirants who have the dynamism and ability to excel in the field of insolvency resolution. Students who complete the GIP will be eligible for registration as an insolvency professional without having to wait to acquire the minimum 10 years' experience as required by the Code at present. The University recognizes the importance of exposure to commercial laws and enables students to be well equipped to understand its implications in the practical world.

INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

The students of the University have learned immensely from its vastly experienced faculty. The faculty in conjunction with students has played a seminal role in contributing to reformation of the national Intellectual Property Rights ("IPR") regime. The Cell for Studies in Intellectual Property Rights ("CSIPR") has been the spearheading organization of the University's activities, with a vision to promote the culture of knowledge creation in India. Pursuant to its mission of promoting research and disseminating information and ideas in the field of Intellectual Property laws, CSIPR has organized conferences and workshops on various themes in the field of IPR in collaboration with the Ministry of Human Resource Development and the Ministry of Industry and Commerce of the Government of India. The University also offers a unique opportunity to two students on fellowship to attend the prestigious IP Summer School for three weeks, each year, at the Centre for Advanced Studies & Research in Intellectual Property ("CASRIP") at the University of Washington, Seattle, in the United States of America.




DATA PROTECTION

The Cell for Law and Technology ("CLT") was established in 2019 at the University with the primary aim of generating awareness and facilitating research initiatives in the field of technology laws. The CLT launched 'Gig(a)-bits', an initiative that gives a sneak-peek into topics in the fields of technology and tech law, in a bite-sized format. A two-day national conference on "Blockchain Technology: Adoption, Regulation, and Security" was organised in collaboration with IICIL, BlockSuits, and the Asian School of Cyber Laws. The Cell also hosted the CLT- Talk Show, a technolegal webinar series wherein several eminent personalities discuss their insights on emerging technological innovations and their impact on the world. CLT has an active blog that features posts from Cell members and external contributors. The Cell recently organised the first edition of their flagship tech-fest "Techtonic", which comprised of a panel discussion, debating and quizzing events, and the flagship NLIU Policy Case Competition.

LABOUR AND EMPLOYMENT LAWS

Centre for Labour Laws ("CLL") is a budding new cell established with the objective of providing a platform for research on policy, institutional, legal and regulatory issues centred on labour and allied benefits laws in India. The Labour and Employment Law Blog has been established by CLL to stimulate academic research and discussion to help develop accessible understanding of contemporary labour and employment law issues. The cell published its first Journal on Labour Law this academic year. CLL also submitted its recommendations for the draft rules under the newly adopted Occupational Safety, Health, and Working Conditions Code.



ARTS, SPORTS AND CULTURE

Arts, culture and sports have become increasingly significant today as they afford the students an opportunity to learn the lessons and skills that the conventional pedagogy doesn't offer. Even during the pandemic, the NLIU spirit soared high in these skies.

JUS CULTURA: THE DEBATING, QUIZZING & LITERARY SOCIETY OF NLIU ("JC")

JC aims to motivate and nurture the intellectual-creative skills of the student community. It is an umbrella cell that consists of the following three societies:

- 1. The Debating Society: We train the students in the ancient art of argumentation without the technical restraints of moots. The biweekly practice debates encourage the students to engage in constructive debates pertaining to contemporary social issues and much more. We also inculcate managerial and organizational skills in the students by hosting students from all over India and the neighbouring countries, in numerous debating tournaments throughout the year.
- 2. The Quizzing Society: Quizzing is to the mind, like running is to the body. Weekly quizzes on Instagram and a knowledge series discussing issues of relevance keeps the students intellectually charged and socially updated. We host an annual national quiz competition in the esteemed presence of Indian grandmasters.
- 3. The Literary Society: Here we aim at creatively exposing the law students to their most primary tool language. The bi-annual magazine 'Aawaz' offers a platform to the student community by inviting pieces of creative writing ranging from poems to short stories. 'Read, Recite, Repeat' is an online initiative to encourage the literature lovers to share their favourites while we engage in an interesting conversation about books and poems.

THE SPORTS COMMITTEE

We conduct and encourage sporting activities throughout college and organise extramural and intramural tournaments in the university. We also ensure providing leisure time activities in college including zip-lining, archery, paint ball, and tug-of-war to foster greater participation of the student community in sports. Our flagship sporting event 'Virudhaka' has seen 12 editions with increasing participation every year, from students all over India.

The students also participate in local marathons to raise awareness about important issues.

ATHENA

The cultural society provides a platform to the student community to nurture and show-case their talents in the fields of dramatics, music, art, dance and photography. MPzero4 is our flagship event in partnership with JC, where students from all over India join us in celebrating our love for the cultural arts. Social media has been our stage during the pandemic where students shared their work with us and encouraged the student community to keep going.









STUDENT INITIATIVES AND PROBONO ACTIVITIES

The University has undertaken several projects that have won acclaim for community service across India and not just the state of Madhya Pradesh. The student body has been making its contribution through People United for Law Education and Rehabilitation ("P.U.L.E.R."), a social welfare group that helps in providing primary and secondary education to children of nearby villages of Mendori, Mendora and Kerwa. The group has successfully worked towards spreading awareness about various legal issues and empowering students on working towards a clean and sustainable environment.

The Cell for Awareness and Research in Environment Law Studies ("CARES") is a core cell of the University, which aims at spreading awareness among the masses to sensitize towards the environment and related issues through seminars, cleanliness drives and street plays.

Manthan, established in 2013, works towards fostering awareness and consciousness among students about current affairs and issues of national deliberation as well as on crucial events affecting the world. The discussions are interdisciplinary which help the students to enhance their knowledge and develop holistically into socially aware and responsible citizens. The University has also been at the forefront in ensuring gender equality and promoting discourse on gender justice. The Gender Justice Cell ("GJC") was established with this aim and continues to work relentlessly in raising concerns against the acts of injustice and discrimination perpetrated on grounds of sex, and addresses the causes and consequences of gender inequality

In the year, 2018 the students of the University undertook the laudable initiative of providing free legal assistance to the socially and economically backwards sections of the society and to conduct related activities for the general welfare of people. With this objective, the NLIU Legal Aid Clinic ("LAC") was established and in the short span of its existence, the cell has done monumental work in spreading awareness about the justice system at the grassroots level.

IDIA's Madhya Pradesh Chapter being run at NLIU helps underprivileged children in attempting and clearing national legal entrance exams. It has been successful in paving the way towards a prestigious law school for at least one trainee every year.

Covid Sanjeevani', an initiative by NLIU students, gives real-time updates about the availability of medicines, injections, ICU beds, oxygen cylinders, and concentrators, plasma donors across India. They also share reliable sources of help, verified information, and updates to those in need, all on a pro-bono basis.

In order to help stranded migrants reach their homes, Centre for Labour Law (CLL) announced the launch of its website "www.mazdoormitra.info". The aim of the portal was to provide easy access to all the government and non-government information for the stranded migrant workers in times of crisis at one place.





BLOGS AND PUBLICATIONS

The NLIU Law Review is a student-run, peer-reviewed academic journal of the University. It features research articles by members of the legal profession, academia such as practitioners, professors, legal experts and students. With its enthusiastic editorial board of nearly 61 editors, the Law Review has successfully published seventeen issues till date and regularly records hundreds of entries for these issues across various topics.

The various cells of the college also have their specialised journal publications and blogs. The NLIU Arbitration forum in collaboration has successfully released three editions of the Indian Arbitration Review with a specific focus on arbitration law and policy. 



PLACEMENT COORDINATION COMMITTEE

The Placement Coordination Committee ("PCC") holds the responsibility of facilitating the recruitment procedure at the University.

The PCC provides a transparent, credible, and accountable interface between prospective employers and the graduating students. The representatives of each batch are selected by and work under the able guidance of the Chairperson Dr. Sushma Sharma and Faculty Coordinators, Mrs. Shushma Sharma. The PCC is considered as an integral part of the University's education system and contributes by organizing various personality development and awareness programs as a part of the learning process for the students. The PCC is engaged in coordinating internships and placements, for which it seeks to instil functional knowledge and specific skills among the students by:

- 1. Organising workshops and seminars conducted by various luminaries on: Placement related subjects and topics Resume Writing Judicial Services and Civil Services.
- 2. Organising regular career counselling, mock interviews and group discussion programmes for the graduating batch.
- 3. Providing regular counselling and personalized career guidance to the students.
- 4. Maintaining a catalogue of recent developments in the field of law to generate awareness amongst students.

PLACEMENT PROCESS AT NLIU

According to the placement rules at the University, prospective employers can recruit via pre-placement offers or the campus placement process.

Prospective employers are requested to intimate the PCC about the selection or shortlisting of any student of the Batch of 2024 for a PPO at placementcommittee.nliu@gmail.com by **5**th**July**, **2023**.

The University shall begin the campus placement process in the month of **August**, **2023** and Day Zero is scheduled from **4**th **to 6**th **August**, **2023**. The placement process continues till the end of the academic year of students in their fifth year, i.e., till April 2024.

DAY ZERO PROCESS AT NLIU

The PCC ensures optimal flexibility to all prospective recruiters. For Day Zero recruitments, the following broad steps may be followed by recruiters (the steps are not mandatory or exhaustive):

- 1. Recruiters may conduct Pre-Placement Talks (PPT) highlighting the profile of the organization, career prospects, compensation packages, et al. These PPTs can be conducted at any time before the Pre-Interview Screening.
- 2. Recruiters may conduct a Pre-Interview Screening Process, including group discussions, at any time before the final interview. The Curricula Vitae of all interested students shall be forwarded to the recruiter, and the recruiters are free to determine their own policy for the Screening Process to shortlist students.
- 3. The recruiter shall formulate a Final Interview list subsequent to the completion of the Pre-Interview Screening Process or otherwise and the same must be communicated to the PCC along with a waitlist of students. All interviews being conducted on the same day may be conducted in different time slots.
- 4. All results shall be declared simultaneously by the PCC at the end of Day Zero to ensure that no recruiter is prejudiced. The recruiters will be required to disclose the results of their Final Interviews and any Offer made to applicant(s) only through the PCC. The recruiters are requested to disclose a Waitlist along with the final offers. In the event of overlapping offers, the waitlisted candidates will become eligible for the final offers.

PLACEMENT RULES

- 1. If a member of the Placement Process receives an offer of employment independent of the PCC and accepts it, he/she will be barred from any further participation in the Placement Process.
- 2. If a member of the Placement Process receives an offer of employment, it would be deemed to be an acceptance of the offer by the member. Thereafter, that member is barred from any further participation in the Placement Process.
- 3. With more than one employer recruiting from the campus on the same day, the results will be declared after all the interviews for the day are over and if a candidate is selected by more than one organization, the choice of selection lies with the candidate. Thereafter, the candidate is barred from any further participation in the Placement Process.
- 4. The prospective employers are strongly urged to provide a waiting list of candidates along with the final offers. Only in the event of overlapping offers, the waitlisted candidates will become eligible for the final offer from the prospective employer, if such employer considers this appropriate.
- 5. Decision of the Faculty regarding any dispute arising during the course of the entire Placement Process will be taken keeping in mind the larger interest of the students and will be final and binding on all interested parties.

ROLLING PLACEMENTS

The on-campus Placement Process continues after the Day Zero, throughout the year. It can be divided into Pre-Placement Session and the Recruitment Day. PRE-PLACEMENT TALK (PPT)

The recruiters have the option of engaging the students in an interactive session, either on-campus or through video-conferencing, highlighting the salient features of the organisation, the job profile being offered, remuneration, terms and conditions of employment and other relevant information as the recruiter thinks fit. They may also conduct lectures on niche areas of law. The recruiters are urged to indicate their preferred dates for such talks to the PCC, either by email or telephonic communication, at least a week in advance.

RECRUITMENT DAY

Recruiters are welcome to follow their own recruitment process, broadly within the framework of group discussions, written tests, and personal interviews. The PCC sits as an impartial judge to oversee that the processes are being carried out with utmost fairness that is the hallmark of this University and to ensure that the Recruiters are facilitated at every step in their assessment processes. Recruiters can also opt for Telephonic Interviews and interviews via Video Conferencing. The recruiters are requested to intimate the PCC with their preferred dates in the final placement schedule at the earliest.
